High bandwidth policy

An overview of the key points

- There was a lot of political discussion about a seamless high-speed broadband network across Switzerland and numerous initiatives were discussed. The demand to increase the minimum bandwidth in basic service provision to 80 Mbit/s prevailed. The purpose of the basic service provision is to provide users in remote locations with a minimum range of telecommunications services (telephony, Internet access etc.).
- The Ordinance on Telecommunications Services is simultaneously being revised. The new regulation is ex-pected at the beginning of 2023. For Swisscom, it is crucial that the technology that is most suitable for the basic provision of 80 Mbit/s is used (mobile communications, satellite, combination with fixed network). In addition, the expansion must be demand-driven only and will be omitted if a local provider is already provid-ing the service.

Swisscom's position

- Swisscom stands by a reliable basic service in Switzerland and has been providing this since 1999 without compensation from the public sector. The basic service provision should ensure that users in remote loca-tions also have access to a minimum range of affordable, market-based prices.
- The significant increase in minimum bandwidth to 80 Mbit/s deviates from the classic understanding of universal service in the sense of a minimum offer and brings this to the market.
- Swisscom considers the expansion of the basic service provision feasible with an additional high-speed broadband Internet access service of 80 Mbit/s, provided that the guidelines agreed upon by the industry, administration and politics in the run-up to the revision are implemented consistently and in a practical manner:
 - True technological freedom: Free choice of technology by the licensee
 - Subsidiarity principle: No obligation to develop if the location has already been developed by another provider
 - · Service offering: Appropriate implementation periods and demand-oriented development
- However, increasing the basic service to 80 Mbit/s is only a short-term solution. The basic service is a
 safety net with a minimum range of telephony and Internet for remote locations, which will eventually
 reach its limits. A long-term strategy is needed to provide high-bandwidth Internet coverage across
 Switzerland where the market does not provide this coverage. To this end, the National Council commissioned the Federal Coun-cil to draw up a broadband strategy (Postulate 21.3461). Swisscom welcomes
 this advancement.
